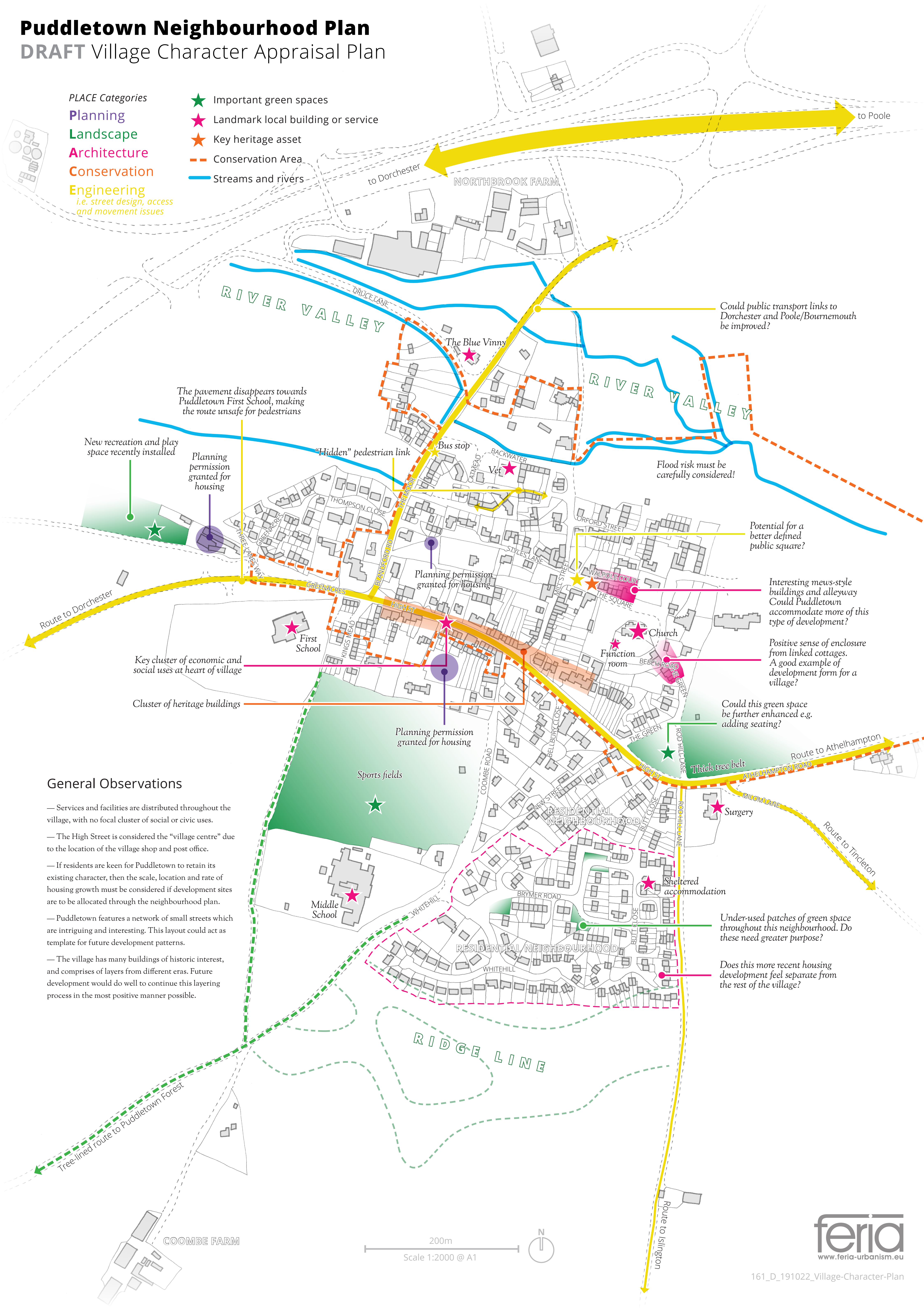

General Observations

- Services and facilities are distributed throughout the village, with no focal cluster of social or civic uses.
- The High Street is considered the “village centre” due to the location of the village shop and post office.
- If residents are keen for Puddletown to retain its existing character, then the scale, location and rate of housing growth must be considered if development sites are to be allocated through the neighbourhood plan.
- Puddletown features a network of small streets which are intriguing and interesting. This layout could act as template for future development patterns.
- The village has many buildings of historic interest, and comprises of layers from different eras. Future development would do well to continue this layering process in the most positive manner possible.
